Opera in the Ozarks
is Planning a 2021 Season "In the Bubble"
(reprinted with permission from December
2020 OIO Good News Letter)

Opera in the Ozarks has announced an unusual season planned for the summer of 2021.

Due to the expectation of there being continued restrictions relating to the Covid-19 pandemic, Opera in the Ozarks is planning on maintaining a "bubble" around the campus for any directors, performers, orchestra musicians, and other staff who are brought to Eureka Springs a few days before the summer session begins. They would all be tested for Covid-19 and isolated for several days before the session begins.

When all have cleared quarantine, Opera in the Ozarks would take place much as in years past, except that nobody would be allowed to leave the campus. A few outsiders such as certain grounds crew, kitchen crew, and so forth would be allowed inside the "bubble" but only after taking stringent precautions.

Performances would be held as usual in the theater, but audience members would need to stay well back from the stage and be socially distant in order to protect the performers and others in the "bubble."

Artistic Director Tom Cockrell has determined that only two operas, rather than three, will take place in the summer of 2021. Those will be the Massenet comedy *Cendrillon* and the Donizetti drama *Lucia di Lammermoor*. A revised schedule and other details will be announced in the spring.

Member Spotlight: Sue Breuer

Born into a musical family with four siblings, Sue Breuer began piano study at age eight in Kingsville, Texas with Lillian Wheat Kennedy, who had been taught by Hans Richard and Eugen D'Albert at the Kidd-Key Conservatory in Sherman, Texas. They both had studied with Franz Liszt, who studied with Carl Czerny, whose teacher was Beethoven! Sue also enjoyed playing oboe during her high school and college years. Her mother and her piano teacher were both members of the Kingsville Club, and she played for their programs at times.

A few months after graduation from Texas A & I College (now A & M at Kingsville), Joe Breuer and Sue were married and moved to the Rio Grande Valley. Joe re-

ceived a new assignment from Texas Parks and Wildlife Department as a Marine Biologist, and the couple set up house-keeping in Harlingen. Soon the children totaled four: Martin, Tom, Carl, and Paula (finally got that girl!).

Sue worked intermittently as a secretary (GMAC and a car dealership), always playing piano for Sunday school, singing in the choir, and joining the Music Club. When the children were all in school, Sue began an 18-year stint as a secretary at Pittman and Davis, the leading mail-order citrus fruit company in the Valley. After the children finished school, it was time for Joe's retirement, so Sue retired also, and the couple moved to the waiting property near Dripping Springs to start a new phase of their lives. Joe had had cancer surgery by that time, but they both enjoyed several years of quiet, happy living in the Hill Country, and they were able to travel extensively.

At a state-wide music club convention in 1968, several members of Wednesday Morning Music Club befriended Sue and invited her to join the club. Sue served on many WMMC committees, and then she held offices including WMMC President, District President and State President. After Joe passed in 1990, Sue moved to Austin. Grandchildren came, and there are now five, plus a great-granddaughter, all wonderful, of course! In 2015, Sue's daughter Paula moved in with Sue to care for her and to help her in her "senior" years.

During her term as President of the Texas Federation, Sue attended National Conventions in all parts of the country, and she has been attending ever since. She also enjoyed performances at Opera in the Ozarks near Eureka Springs, Arkansas with other WMMC members. Soon Sue was on the Opera In The Ozarks governing board, and she served as Vice President for several years. She is now retired from OIO duties. At the National Music Club level, Sue has served in the following positions: Chair of the Stillman-Kelly Award (for high school instrumentalists) and the Thelma Byrum Award (an adjunct award for pianists only). Sue has been our National Historian, and she is currently Texas Historian.

It's Festival Time! The annual District 6-3 Festival is January 30<sup>th</sup> and the District 6-1 Festival is February 27<sup>th</sup>. Both are online Festivals, for the first time, and everyone is becoming more tech savvy, whether they wanted to or not!

We decided to ask all students to video their pieces (2 in a row performances, except for the concertos) and upload them to YouTube and then send in a link to view them. This keeps all of us from using huge amounts of data on our computers and phones. All sheet music must be sent in as pdfs, right side up pages only. The Festival Chair then receives the pdfs as a shared folder from the teacher. Theory Tests are sent sealed to teachers and they must distribute them to their students. # Lookin' at Lyrics, and other stuff by Marque McKay

Folks tend to take the decoding and appreciation of sound for granted. Not everyone, of course. Those of us who have lost our hearing greatly miss the taglines of jokes, the lyrics of songs, the chatter of children, the whispers of dear ones. Because most of us experience hearing loss gradually, we do not fully realize that we are losing not just the pleasures of hearing but also the physical brain patterns by which those experiences become memories and enrich the soul.

In October of 2020, I received a Cochlear Implant behind my left ear. This meant that without the sound processor that clings to the implant magnetically through my scalp, my left ear could no longer register and decode outside sound. That word "outside" is very important. I was prepared for that. What I was not prepared for was the deluge of internal sound that flooded the left side of my head WITHOUT the processor. The professional hearing folks say the experience is totally individual. For me, first and foremost came the sound of my own heart, beating like a John Phillips Sousa drum corps. ("See your heart doctor," it said. I did. All is well.)

Next, with the sound processor, "soft-shoe" crunch intrusions danced around me: scratching an itch, brushing lint off my sleeve, chewing food, folding clothes, wiping a counter. EVERYTHING made "ch" sounds. And I had FORGOTTEN them. Truly. Those everyday sounds which we DISREGARD came flooding in and overwhelmed almost everything else. And muffled, genderless voices issued from a 40 foot deep well, muddied by unnecessary, intruding STUFF. The doctor had promised that the brain would gradually (think six to twelve months) regain speech discrimination and recognition of which sounds to disregard or appreciate. I did not appreciate that I had lost the entire upper register of sound. And I did not know that the implant procedure would also take away my music.

Oh, yes. I can still "hear" music, but my processed notes do not yet match those of the exterior world. That will take time and much more effort. However, music WITHOUT the processor is constant. It started within the first week with a loud set of bagpipes (think perpetual drone note, about a low D. That was the first thing that had to change, and it took strong concentration!) Now, an obedient pipe organ plays, usually in the key of G (or others if I work at it), in entire arrangements, but only below middle C. It plays hymns, Christmas Carols, folk music, pop, nursery tunes, etc. Simple stuff. Perpetually. Always. Continually. (I'm getting tired of "The 12 days of Christmas" in spite of the neat chord changes.) So what does this have to do with lyrics, you ask?

The other day I endured several hours of "We Gather Together To Ask the Lord's Blessing" until the lyrics finally surfaced as well as the music. And I realized that I did not know what they meant.

We gather together to ask the Lord's blessing,
He chastens and hastens his will to make known; — Nice internal rhyme
The wicked oppressing now cease from distressing, — Ooo, Theodore Baker, 1851-1934, you did it again!
Sing praises to His name: He forgets not his own. — What?

Poets can be obscure, but in a hymn? If the line is parallel, as established in the previous two lines, Baker is saying "... his own"... name. Surely not. Probably "... his own"... people. He broke his own poetic rule. But then he is merely translating from the Dutch folk hymn. And the rest is very clear, ending with "O Lord, make us free."

I can not only thank the Lord but also the scientific community which has made this miracle possible. I am learning to hear again, gradually extending my range, retraining my brain, discovering the wonderment of bird song, wind in the trees, and my beloved's voice anew. There was a reason those lyrics stuck in my soul. I needed them.
